## Cookson Hills Electric District Meetings Scheduled for August

Cookson Hills Electric Cooperative will hold district meetings during August for those members who live in District 2, District 4, and District 6.

William R. Wilson currently serves as the trustee representing

Cookson's District 2, William T. Mills serves as the trustee of District 4, and Joe Ogle serves as the trustee of District 6.

Your cooperative holds district meetings in order for you to elect your representatives to the Cookson Hills Board of Trustees. These local meetings are essential to Cookson Hills, a democratically controlled utility, owned by those who receive its services. The elected officials represent the member-owners. Cookson Hills Electric holds

trustee elections at the district meetings, and attending gives you, as a co-op member, the opportunity to choose who will represent you on your co-op's board of directors.

A seven member board of directors governs Cookson Hills, which divides its service area into seven districts with one trustee representing each district for a three year term. The board establishes policy and monitors cooperative finances and procedures. The board has set the following dates and times for the 2009 District meetings: District

## Satisfying our Energy Appetite

### Requires a Diverse Menu

We're in the middle of a green revolution in America, with towering wind turbines and bright solar arrays dominating headlines as the future of electric generation. No doubt, those technologies will certainly take on a bigger role in "keeping the lights on." But despite media hype, they won't totally replace "conventional" sources for producing electricity, such as coal, natural gas, and nuclear power, any time soon.

To meet growing demand for electricity, electric co-ops will continue to mix and match generation resources, finding the best way to balance environmental concerns while ensuring 34200 delivery of affordable and reliable power. And because federal climate change legislation will likely boost the price for every kilowatt generated by fuels that emit carbon dioxide, notably coal and natural gas, nuclear power may very well become an attractive option once again.

For starters, nuclear power doesn't release carbon dioxide in the air. It's also reliable (available 24/7), unlike other renewable energy options that are dependent on breezes or daylight. In the past, nuclear power has faced opposition because of waste and safety concerns. However, commercial nuclear reactors have been operating since the 1950s. In addition, other countries have jumped on the nuclear bandwagon in a big way,

and perfected the technology. Over the past 40 years, for example, France built enough nuclear power stations to provide two-thirds of the nation's energy, and in the process recycled the radioactive waste created—using it over and over again as fuel.

In the United States, largely because of added construction costs imposed on nuclear plants following the Three Mile Island accident in 1979, no new nuclear facilities have been ordered and built from scratch since 1973. That's a long drought. However, utilities are ready to break ground on 26 nuclear reactors in 16 states, with another 11 reactors in the planning stages. These new reactors, if built, will run much more efficiently and generate more power.

Even with a nuclear renaissance, coal will remain a keystone of electric power in the U.S. More than half of the nation's electricity is generated by coal; the goal is to burn it as cleanly as possible.

So the next time you hear someone talk about nuclear power or clean coal, remember both of these fuels are key to keeping power affordable and reliable. We will have to mix and match our resources if we want to find a balanced, sustainable solution for our energy future, while keeping our electricity affordable and reliable.

## Expert Tips Home Cooling Tips

- Clean or change air conditioner filters monthly. Make sure any outside air conditioner compressor is free of dirt and debris. The flow of air is the key to cooling, so don't make your system work harder than needed.
- Cook meals, run the dishwasher and dry clothes during the cooler times of the day.
- Use fans to keep air moving. A ceiling fan uses only about as much electricity as a light bulb - far less than an air conditioner.
- Close drapes and shades during the day to keep heat out of your house.
